

115 Miles

We depart from Elmer's @ 9 AM

Take I-5 north, cross over into WA and take Hwy 14 east for 37 miles

Turn Right for Rest Stop at the Beacon Rock State Park then continue east on Hwy 14 for 9miles

In Stevenson, Turn Right at Waterfront Exit, then merge back onto Hwy 14 for 21 miles

Turn Right and cross the Hood River Bridge for 1.5 miles entering Hood River

Turn right onto State street thru town then Left onto 13th street

Continue on 13th St which becomes 12th St., keep right on Tucker Rd

After two more turns on Tucker Rd watch for the Western Antique Aeroplane and Automobile Museum

After the Museum visit Return to Hood River.

Lunch at Shari's Resturant, 1803 12th St. Or Hood River Taqueria, 1210 13th St


After Lunch we will meet at Shari's to **continue** North on 12th St, **Turn Right on** May St, then **Left** to stay on 12st. **Turn Right** on State St then **Left** onto 2nd St then **Right** on Hwy I-84 East for 8 miles **Take Mosier exit 69** and continue on Hwy 30 for 12 miles

Stop at the Rowena Crest Viewpoint

Continue on Hwy 30 for 13 miles thru the Dalles

Take Hwy 197 for 13 miles to Dufur

The History of Dufur



When settlers began to move into Oregon in 1845-1846, Samual K. Barlow had built a road which crossed the Cascade Mountains from <u>The Dalles</u> to Oregon City. This became known as the Barlow Road which provided a way to cross the mountains for thousands of people over the next 75 years. The road crossed Fifteen Mile Creek which is the present site of Dufur. This was a favorite resting and camping spot for travelers, however no permanent residence was taken

there until 1852 when Lewis P. Henderson moved to the site. When Indian hostilities began in Walla Walla, ten families decided to join those already living in the valley along Fifteen Mile Creek. Together they built a fort about 2 miles west of the crossing for protection.

Since the settlement was located along the creek and was 15 miles from The Dalles, the area became known as Fifteen Mile Crossing. In 1863, Fifteen Mile House was erected which became a safe haven for travelers along the Barlow Road. It was basically a farm house but provided accommodations for people and animals.

In 1872, **Andrew J. Dufur** and his brother **Enoch Burnham Dufur** settled at Fifteen Mile Crossing and purchased 600 acres of land. Their primary activities were stock raising which were mainly sheep. The brothers father, **A.J. Dufur** of Williamstown, Vermont later came to join them. A.J. Dufur had been active in politics while in Vermont and later became well-respected in political circles after coming to Oregon.

In 1878, the first general merchandising business was established on the north side of the creek by Chauncy



A. Williams who had originally lived in Michigan. During this time, mail had to be delivered from The Dalles so Mr. Williams petitioned that a post office be added as part of his store. The story that had been passed down in the Dufur family was the scene of Mr. Williams and A.J. Dufur standing in front of what is known today as Kramers Market arguing about what the name of the post office should be. On February 6, 1893, Dufur was the given name and has remained so until this day.

The Dufur sons platted the town site on December 10, 1880. They proved themselves to be very enterprising and the town was incorporated in February of 1893 by the Oregon Legislature. It is not clear exactly what date in February this happened as some records say it was on the 10th while the city seal is for the 6th. By 1889, Dufurs population was at 500.

History of the Balch Hotel

In 1907, the Balch Hotel was built by Charles Balch and became the center of many social events. Mrs. Balch was Lois Dufur who was the daughter of Andrew J. Dufur Jr. In 1913, the Ingels family bought the property and continued to operate as a hotel until the mid-40²s. The hotel was eventually sold and became an apartment and rooming house until being purchased in 1988 by Howard and Pat Green. The Balch Hotel was completely restored and is listed on the National Historic Registry. It currently operates as a Bed and Breakfast.

Taking Hwy 197 South 15 miles then at the town of Tygh Valley Turn left onto Hwy 216 for 4 miles then **Rest** Stop at White River Falls continue on Hwy 216, for 4 miles, watch for (Steep down grade) Turn Right onto BLM Access road for 12 miles to Maupin Turn Right into Maupin

Lunch at the Imperial River Company

Continue on Hwy 197 for 47 miles to Madras In Madras, take Hwy 26 North then **Turn Left** onto Cherry Ln. then a Right onto Berg Dr. **Stop** at the Erickson Aircraft Collection. 2408 NW Berg Dr, Madras

Return to Hwy 26 and go South, merge with Hwy 97. Continue on Hwy 97 to 12 St. in Madras. The Quality Inn will be on the right.



The History of Frenchglen

The community is named after the French-Glenn Livestock Company, founded by Hugh J. Glenn and later joined by his son-in-law, Peter French. French-Glenn built its headquarters there in 1872.

Frenchglen is an unincorporated community in Harney County, Oregon. It is 60 miles south of Burns on Oregon Route 205 and its population is 12.

The History of Frenchglen Hotel

The Frenchglen Hotel was

established in 1916 by Swift & Company Meat Packers who then owned the P Ranch. The current building was constructed in 1923 and contained five rooms. It was built for the people who came into the valley to do business with Swift & Company and other ranchers in the area.


For several years in the 1930's, the teachers of the Frenchglen school lived at the hotel. The school district paid the hotel \$30.00 in warrants for a months rent which also included three meals a day. The hotel manager would carry the teachers' lunch to school each day.

Around 1934 the Department of Fish & Wildlife bought the P Ranch which encompassed most of the Blitzen Valley. This area then became part of the Malheur Wildlife Refuge. The hotel was included in this purchase. About this time the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) crews planted the large Carolina poplars you can see around town. In order to get through the hard pan that existed they had to blast holes for the trees with dynamite. In 1938 the CCC crew added onto and remodeled the hotel. The bathrooms were put in at this time. They also added a gasoline powered power plant so the hotel now had its own electricity. The system wasn't too reliable but it was still better then using kerosene lamps (this according to Katherine Fine, daughter of Jennie McDonald who managed the hotel at that time). This system was in use until January of 1959 when Harney Electric Cooperative brought electric power to the area. Oregon State Parks acquired the hotel in 1972 and in 1975 remodeled it to it's present state.





Leave Lakeview @ 8:30 AM

Take Hwy 140 West toward Crater Lake, 42 miles **Rest Stop** and gas in Bly then 53 miles to <u>Lunch at Melita's Cafe on Hwy 97 in Chiloquin</u> Gas is available at the Indian Casino 2 miles south on Hwy 97

Next available Gas in Prospect 66 miles

From the gas station go south and take a sharp Right turn onto Hwy 62 toward Crater Lake for 30 miles

Turn Right at Crater Lake south entrance and stop at
Crater Lake Lodge
Continue back to Hwy 62 and go west toward Prospect for 16 miles

Turn Left onto Hwy 230 for 13 miles Take Prospect exit to arrive at Historic Prospect Hotel 391 Mill Creek dr., Prospect (541) 560-3664

The History of Prospect.

Prospect began as a logging town; its first sawmill began operating in 1870.^[4] Prospect had a post office established in 1882 that was first named "Deskins" after the first postmaster.^[5] In 1888, there was a mill named Deskins Sawmill. The name of the community was changed to "Prospect" in 1889 because of plans made to run a railroad up the Rogue River, which would ostensibly improve the community's prospects.

The History of Prospect Hotel

Albion Howard Boothby and his wife Jennie moved to Prospect (then called Deskins) from Maine in the early 1870s. In the mid 1880s they moved their young family to Ashland, but after six years they returned to their home on Mill Creek and to the town now known as Prospect.

By this time Crater Lake was a popular attraction, and tourists from Medford spent two full days reaching the lake by wagons and carriages. The Prospect area made an excellent halfway point for these travelers, and many of them stayed with Albion and Jennie. The Boothbys soon realized their house was not large enough to serve all the travelers who came, and they decided to build a "roadhouse," or hotel. The hotel was named the **Boothby House**, and welcomed not only travelers but also locals who knew of Jennie's talents as a cook. The Boothby House became a center of the community, hosting dances, parties and town events.


In 1897 the Boothbys moved to Klamath Falls and sold the hotel. It was run by Mrs. George Hollenbeak and her daughter Pearl, under the ownership of Ray Electrical Company. In 1912, Jim Grieve bought the hotel and added a gas station and store, and built cabins behind the hotel. Boothby House was rechristened Grieve's Prospect Hotel. Under Jim's direction (and thanks to his wife Mary's cooking) the hotel thrived once again.

In 1909 President Theodore Roosevelt had declared Crater Lake to be one of the wonders of the world, and the hotel's guest books of the time show travelers from as far away as Italy, France, Germany, Hungary and Russia. Many of the United States' most prominent citizens also stayed at the hotel, including William Jennings Bryan, Zane Grey, John Muir, Jack London, Gifford Pinchot, President Roosevelt and President Herbert Hoover.

In 1985 the hotel was bought by John and Carol Record, who committed over a million dollars to restore the building that had fallen badly into disrepair. They replaced the cabins behind the hotel with 14 motelstyle units and added their own log house on the grounds. The restoration of the hotel was extremely complex, and included replacing the foundation, all plumbing and electrical fixtures, and every window. The guest rooms were meticulously restored using antiques and handmade quilts, with vintage photos for reference.

Just as their dream was being realized, John Record was killed in a plane crash in 1989. Carol completed the restoration and opened the hotel later that year, exactly one hundred years after the Boothbys first opened their home to guests in 1889. Carole Record died in April 1991.

In January 1998 the hotel was bought by Mike and Jo Turner. Like Jennie Boothby and Mary Grieve, Jo has made the Dinner House a favorite of guests and locals alike. Prospect is once again a popular stop for travelers enjoying the natural wonders of the area. The Prospect Hotel, which opened in 1892, was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1980.

Continue on Hwy 138 for 46 miles to Steamboat

Continue on Hwy 138 for 22 miles

Rest Stop at the Colliding Rivers Park in Glide Continue on Hwy 138 for 1.5 mile Turn Right onto North Bank Rd. for 17 miles

In Wilber keep right to stay on Hwy 99 to Sutherland.

In Sutherland Turn Right on to Central Ave for one block then Turn Left onto North State St. **Continue** north on Hwy 99 to Oakland

Rest Stop in Oakland

Continue north on Hwy 99 onto I-5 for 2 mile.

Take exit 142 and Turn Right onto Goodrich Hwy for 7 miles. Turn Right onto John Long Rd. crossing over Hwy I-5 onto Clover Rd for 8 miles to Drain


In Drain Turn Right Hwy 38 to I-5 and Hwy I-5 to Springfield

(Hosted) Dinner at The Pump Cafe




Sunday, Sept 18th - Springfield to Portland
